Dear CRY America Supporter,

Thank you for supporting CRY America during another difficult year. While the world continued to cope with the challenges the pandemic brought, our children suffered from issues like school closures, hunger, loss of parental wages and spikes in cases of child labor, child marriage & abuse.

The CRY America Board approved annual plans that addressed ground realities, specifically fundraising and grant deployment efforts. We deployed grants to COVID-19 relief efforts in India targeted at funding community awareness sessions, distribution of PPE materials, nutrition programs, ensuring vaccinations and Bridge Schools that helped overcome learning gaps.

Thank you for supporting several online events that were organized throughout the year, including the CRY Virtual Gala's across 5 cities with Celebrity Usha Uthup, the CRY WALK, CRYKet and CRY Superstar. A grant of \$4.3 million was approved by the Oak Foundation directed towards 15 additional projects in West Bengal and Jharkhand for the period July 2021 till June 2024.

With your ongoing support, we will continue to stand strong and help children grow happy and healthy.

CRY America's COVID-19 Response In 2021

The pandemic took a particularly cruel toll among underprivileged communities in India. Our project workers risked their lives to undertake community awareness programs on COVID-19 protocols while our donors maintained their funding support unabated throughout the crisis. Thank you for standing by India's most vulnerable children through these challenging times.

The long term impact of this prolonged crisis is going to be devastating as progress made in terms of critical children's issues has been reversed by many years. We supported our partner CRY India's efforts to help children and their families by providing a grant of \$50,000 directed towards:



COVID 19 drives and awareness: In many parts of India, especially in remote villages, getting children and their families vaccinated was a significant challenge. Teams at CRY projects worked hard to organize vaccination drives across projects, while spreading awareness on the importance of vaccines. These efforts were successful and most villages were vaccinated! Read Shahzada's story below, where her entire village in Kashmir became 100% vaccinated through her incredible perseverance.



Pandemic preparedness and management: The 2nd wave gave rise to several apprehensions regarding COVID-19 safety, testing and vaccinations that were addressed. Communities were sensitized about COVID-19 safety precautions by busting myths, managing COVID-19 illness at home and helping children cope with the distress of school closures for over a year.



Safety and protection: Cases of child labor, child marriage and trafficking in all project areas started increasing during the 2nd wave. Children forced into child labor and child marriage due to financial pressures were identified and child protection mechanisms were strengthened along with community awareness on the issues.



Health and nutrition: Children were unable to get proper nutrition, timely immunization or proper healthcare. Hence the team focused on ensuring regular vaccinations, support to lactating and pregnant mothers, addressing malnutrition and awareness around menstrual hygiene



Education: School closures for over a year and lack of digital access led to a gap in children's education. Projects provided worksheets and digital support to help children continue studying. Study sessions for children in small groups using online mediums like WhatsApp were conducted.



Ensuring urgent care for children without parental supervision: The 2nd wave saw some children lose one or both parents to COVID-19, while others parents were in the hospital. CRY ensured the care and protection of such vulnerable children.



How One Girl Got A Whole Village Vaccinated!

Shahzada, a young girl from Kashmir, was trying to do something that came naturally to her-working hard to protect her community against COVID-19. Due to her incredible efforts, her village Brinjan, is now 100% vaccinated.

Shahzada & the CRY project team went door-to-door spreading awareness on how crucial it was to get vaccinated as soon as possible. They helped bring vaccination centres right to the village and organized spot-vaccinations for people in remote areas to ensure no one was left behind.

This amazing 100% vaccination record for Brinjan was possible because of Project Koshish and young girls like Shahzada! We hope to keep empowering our children and creating change through your support.





Reviving Access To Education: Bringing Bus Services To Rural Villages

In some small villages, the absence of public transport made it difficult for children to go to school, as the family had to rely on private transport, which was often expensive and unsafe. Children often faced irregularity at school due to the lack of transportation.

The project team discussed this issue with the Village Child Protection Committees (VCPCs) and community groups. 2 requisitions were given to the Depot Managers asking for special bus services for children in 52 villages before the pandemic hit. When schools reopened, the bus facilities to 7 villages were not revived and 15 children dropped out. Requisitions along with data related to child labor, dropouts, and irregular children were submitted again & the press also spread the message.

The bus services were started during school hours which benefitted 90 boys and 100 girls, who are now going to school.

Project SVK Impact 2021

- 166 children enrolled in anganwadi
- 242 parents received orientation on the importance of early education.
- 508 families received work under MGNREGA program
- COVID-19 safety compliance ensured in 11 Schools and 81 anganwadi centers.
- Double rations ensured for 15 undernourished children
- 140 ANMS (Auxiliary Nursing Midwives) and ASHA (Accredited Social Health Activist) workers, 9 PHC and sub centers received protection materials.

Shefali Sunderlal On "Sunday's With Seema"

CRY America's President Shefali Sunderlal was invited to participate in Sundays with SEEMA, featuring stories of South Asian women who are pushing today's limits and breaking tomorrow's boundaries, broadcast on TV Asia and on SEEMA TV. Given below are excerpts from her interview:

Shefali, tell us about your background, where you grew up & what you studied?

My father's job with ITC required our family to move around India. I was born in Allahabad and did my schooling in Mumbai and Bangalore, Grades 11 and 12 in Kolkata, BSc in Bangalore. After this, I pursued a Masters in Social Work at Delhi University and then came to the USA for an exchange program. In 1990, I got married, shifted to Delhi and joined CRY as a Program Officer.

Tell us about CRY's vision & mission.

The founding of CRY is a fascinating story. Rippan Kapur, an airline purser, felt strongly about injustices faced by children & said "I must do what I can do." This became a mantra at CRY, founded in 1979 by 5 friends contributing Rs.50 each. CRY started at Rippan's mother's dining table & aimed to be a link between the haves and have nots. Projects working to impact children were funded.

How important is it to understand differences in people and culture. Advice to today's youth?

I've been to villages and slums where deprivation and injustices are heightened. There are certain children who cannot attend schools as children from other backgrounds. Every parent wants the best for their children. There are commonalities amongst communities such as food, art, music, but differences and diversity also needs to be respected. Any bias is a barrier to human rights and we must take a stand.



What young people can learn about being in the same organization for a long time?



I've been with CRY for 30 years. The model demonstrates collective action, a holistic rights based approach and impact. I have seen & heard many success stories across projects. At one project, children disappeared from villages to be trafficked. The project partner set up a rescue mission & after checking several locations, found the girls hidden in an underground trench from where they were rescued. CRY's mission-driven approach & impact has gripped me from the start.

Would you like to give advice to people who would like to go for social work full-time?

Firstly, choose the issue or cause you feel strongly about. You can volunteer, donate or fundraise. You can join the organization full-time or part-time. Contribute in whatever way you can.

What motivates you to carry on and advice to a young-woman working in the social sector?

You can do anything you choose to do, despite challenges. The pandemic brought many challenges. Child labor, child marriage and malnutrition increased because of school closures and parental work loss. Relief work included food, vaccines, masks and awareness drives. In fundraising, physical events were canceled and we pivoted to virtual events such as concerts, talent competitions, virtual Galas etc. We are grateful to our donors and volunteers for supporting us during these difficult times.

What are the future plans for CRY and how can people get involved?

When we see the kind of sacrifices people are making at field projects, you feel compelled to continue helping them. CRY America has 25,000 donors, 2,000 volunteers and has benefitted 750,000 children. Going forward, we want to build our monthly giving, corporate giving and legacy giving programs. I am thankful to our donors, volunteers, project partners, media and staff and I am so joyful to be a part of this organization that is working together towards making an impact. There is so much more to be done.

CRY Walk For Child Rights 2021



The CRY Walk for Child Rights 2021 was organized by 14 CRY America volunteer chapters from September 12 through November 14. Our volunteers & staff came together to raise much needed funds for underprivileged children through a combination of virtual & physical walks. 26 volunteers set up their personal fundraising pages & invited their friends & family to donate. Others joined as walkers on the event day, while over 333 supporters donated to the cause.

The CRY New Jersey, Seattle, Delaware & Houston Action Centers organized physical walk events with adherence to local health advisories. Our Seattle youth team organized their 1st walk on September 12 with 50 participating students & their families at the Marymoor Park which raised \$4,200. The event included a 5k walk, along with games which the students enjoyed. Our New Jersey team organized their 10th CRY Walk on Sept 19 at the Roosevelt Park where over 45 supporters walked for children's rights & raised \$6,300. The participants enjoyed the Bollywood workout & yummy Indian snacks. The CRY Houston Walk event was held on November 14 at the Lost









Creek Park which had 75 participants & raised \$11,500. The event started with a fun bollywood warm-up & snacks donated by Vibe restaurant. Our Delaware Chapter raised \$1,500 at their CRY Walk organized on October 23.

Nazia's Journey To Education And Empowerment

Project Shambhunath Singh Research Foundation

Nazia's story is one of resilience and perseverance. Her mother, Ruksana, was forced into marriage at the age of 16, to a man who was more than twice her age. At just 8 years old, Nazia's father passed away, and she and her mother were thrown out of the house by her father's family. Nazia & her mother worked in the pickle factory to make ends meet. They were forced to move from one slum area to another and eventually entered the CRY America supported project area.

Nazia and her mother were reunited with their family when Nazia was 16 years old. However, after 8 years of being a dropout, it was tough for Nazia to get back into school. Through the support of the Project SSRF team, Nazia was enrolled into school & also received a government scholarship. She joined the evening classes where she learned valuable life skills and received gender training, which helped her become a role model for other girls in her community.



Today, Nazia speaks publicly on the survivor platform, Aap-Beti, which gives survivors a platform for dignity and education. Nazia is an inspiration to others. She has overcome tremendous obstacles and is determined to pursue her education further, breaking the cycle of poverty and abuse that she and her mother experienced.

Project SSRF Impact 2021

- 29 children enrolled in grade 1
- 19 children were mainstreamed into formal education
- 60 children completed courses under Digital Learning Center
- 9 child marriages stopped
- 50 children engaged in sports activities
- Action taken on 4 child sexual abuse cases in co-ordination with the authorities

Girls Change Their Community: A Story Of Education & Determination

Project Kalapandhari Magas Vargiya and Adivasi Gramin Vikash Sanstha

In Sevapurtana, a small village in Latur district of Maharashtra, only one primary school offers education until grade 4. Children who wanted to study further had to walk 7kms one way to reach the nearest middle school. Due to the long distance, parents often didn't let their children go to school and they ended up marrying early.

CRY America Project KMAGVS is strengthening adolescent groups in the village & holding awareness sessions for girls on the importance of education. During one such session, girls discussed the problems faced due to the distance to school. Some girls in the group received bicycles from KMAGVS, but that wasn't enough. The girls collectively contacted the school principal and the School Management Committee (SMC) to ask for transportation services.

Thanks to the girls' confidence, they were provided free transportation services. As a result, 48 children in the village could continue their education.



The girls' small act of bravery significantly impacted their community. This showed that with determination & perseverance, they could bring positive change in many children's lives.

Project KMAGVS Impact 2021

- 21 village level Child Protection Committees (VCPCs) formed
- 2 panchayats passed resolution against child marriage & child labor
- 54 child laborers rescued
- 31 rescued child laborers mainstreamed in education
- 86% children were prevented from migration
- Dry ration [food supplies] distributed to 795 households

Review: Conducted programs on International Women's Day, regular interactions with research scholars & a series of lectures on women's rights & gender equality. Organized 2 day online workshop, seminars & dialogues amongst students & researchers on women's issues. Launched internship program.

RAHI Foundation - Grant Disbursed: \$42,031

Objective: To promote policies & practices against child sexual abuse (CSA) & incest & promote survivor recovery.

Review: Trained 28 college students on child sexual exploitation issues; 8 survivors received 43 individual therapy sessions; 6 adult survivors of CSA trained & engaged in social action; 43 mental health providers trained on CSA issues & recovery; 18 journalists trained on incest/ CSA; organized 2 meetings of 23 survivors & allies in Delhi and Kolkata.

Association for Advocacy and Legal Initiatives (AALI) - Grant Disbursed: \$133,083

Objective: To prevent gender based violence & uphold women's access to economic opportunities.

Review: Intervention in 198 incidents of gender & identity based violence; connected 162 women led households to social security programs; 110 meetings conducted to engage young women community leaders. Fact finding to document experiences of women who migrated due to the pandemic.

CRY India - Grant Management Expense Reimbursement for Oak Funded Projects - Disbursed: \$37,917

Objective: Provide onsite grant management support (planning, monitoring, evaluation) for 15 Oak Foundation funded projects.

Review: Annual & half yearly, virtual and in-person project visits conducted by CRY India program staff to monitor progress towards grant objectives; relevant thematic support & organizational development support provided to India grantees funded by Oak Foundation.

CRY India - Grant for Oak Project Trainings - Grant Disbursed: \$5,000

Objective: To strengthen information & skill sets of supported projects towards delivery of grant objectives & improved quality of work with the children & community; knowledge transfer towards sustainability.

Review: Thematic trainings for the staff of grantees included: "Understanding Safe Migration in the context of COVID-19", "Impact of COVID-19 on Psychosocial Health", "COVID-19 Pandemic Impact on Education & National Education Policy", which were attended by 55 project staff.

Boys & Girls Clubs of America (BGCA - USA) - Grant Disbursed: \$30,000

Objective: Address education & health risks caused by COVID-19, support Clubs with safety guidance & training for club staff.

Review: BGCA served youth on-site or virtually; 94% of Clubs remained open through COVID-19 pandemic; clubs served as virtual learning centers & provided meal services; 76% clubs engaged in vaccine awareness.

Children's Rights Inc (CRI - USA) - Grant Disbursed: \$30,000

Objective: Improve lives of neglected & abused children & enable systemic changes towards more sustainable solutions through need-based litigation.

Review: Ensuring child safety & implementation of trauma-informed systems in Milwaukee, Wisconsin; trauma-informed mental health crisis support services for children in Kansas.

Sakhi for South Asian Women (USA) - Grant Disbursed: \$5,000

Objective: Serve youth & families affected by domestic violence in the South Asian community in New York.

Review: Holistic case management of 24 youth survivors, with help in filing police reports, shelter, rent, day care, accessing legal resources & providing school supplies. 3 youth removed from abusive homes; weekly individual counseling sessions to 24 youth & facilitated 5 support groups of 5-10 participants each, which met weekly for 15-30 weeks.

Manavi (USA) - Grant Disbursed: \$5,000

Objective: Transitional home for domestic violence survivors from the South Asian community, especially women & children in New Jersey.

Review: Culturally specific and linguistically appropriate services delivered including: counseling, supplies for transitional home, transportation, childcare and financial assistance for survivors relating to their fundamental needs such as food, shelter, healthcare, and school supplies needed for children at school.

Rescuing Himanshu: A Tale of Child Labor & The Power Of Education

Project Development Education & Environmental Programme

Mohan & Samita Devi lived in a small village, situated in the dense forest of Ramnagar in Bihar where the community relied on daily wage labor to make ends meet.

Their youngest son, Himanshu, was only 14 years old and had completed Grade 8 when he was forced to migrate to Gujarat to work in a rolling mill. It wasn't until his health deteriorated that his mother was notified. Upon hearing about Himanshu, Project DEEP staff contacted the contractor to discuss the situation.

After repeated & persistent discussion, Himanshu's parents agreed to call him back home. Eventually, with the help of Project DEEP staff, the child was able to communicate with his parents & they convinced him to return home. The team made sure that Himanshu arrived home safely & the wages due to him were paid.



Himanshu was enrolled in school & he started attending the Child & Adolescent Resource Center (CARC) daily to catch up on his studies. He is determined to make up for lost time and work hard to build a brighter future for himself & his family through education.
